The heartbeat of my practise is to represent people before courts and tribunals, most often as a criminal defence lawyer. I have appeared in that capacity at all levels of court in British Columbia. I have trial experience with judge-alone and jury trials, and have conducted both in the English and in the French language. I have represented individuals charged with all kinds of criminal allegations, from petty theft to murder. One of my cases received a unanimous, favourable ruling at the Supreme Court of Canada. That decision improved the language rights of francophones charged with provincial offences. I have worked as an ad hoc prosecutor on a few occasions, doing trial work and charge assessment. Throughout, I have also assisted Spanish-speaking clients.

Thanks to criminal defence work, I have forged an array of skills related to problem-solving and trial advocacy. These skills have enhanced my ability to advocate in other areas of practise. In mental health law, I have experience with review board hearings and review panels, as well as cases where criminal and mental health laws intersect (e.g., NCRMD, fitness to stand trial and non-insane automatism). In the area of prisoners' law, I have advocated on behalf of inmates during parole board and disciplinary hearings. Through various professional associations and initiatives, I have contributed over the years to small and larger efforts at bettering the legal profession, and others aimed at improving access to the justice.
